Dear Sir,

I have received a letter from Messrs. Frentzel & Würtz by which I am informed that the ^{sum of} 30 £ is owing to them from Mr. Grabowsky, and that the parcel, on which they expended it, still remains with them. The only thing I can say is that I gave the necessary directions to Mr. Grabowsky to call and to pay for it; that these directions were given to him long ago. Since he has remained silent I must conjecture that either he has neglected the business, or the letter has not reached ^{him}. I have addressed another letter to him last week, and I hope that all will be rectified; — however, in case he should neglect or refuse to do it, you will be kind to inform me of that, and I shall pay the above sum into your hands.

Messrs. Frentzel & Würtz referred me to you, so you will have the goodness to write to them by this post day's post, repeating to them what I have said to you in this. — Yours truly,
