PREFACE.

N compliance with a request often expressed by my English speaking clients I have decided on publishing the Catalogue

of my Castings in the English language.

I would particularly call the attention of all lovers of the fine arts, especially of Rectors of Universities, Directors of Museums and Schools of Art, to my large and varied collection of specimens of ARCHAIC Greek Sculpture (both Statues and reliefs), and for which recently has arisen so great a demand from the chief intellectual centres of Europe; it having there become a settled conviction (although perhaps not yet everywhere openly expressed) that in order to hope to approach to the excellence of the masterpieces of Pheidias and Praxiteles, it will be necessary first to closely study the same models (archaic) which those immortal masters undoubtedly studied in their youth.

My Laboratory is of course replete with excellent copies of

the ripe epoch of Greek Art.

To the Directors of the Department of Antiquities in Athens, and to the Archaeological Society of Greece are known the sacrifices I have made in favour of Greek Archaeology and in acknowledgment thereof, whenever occasion arises, they appoint me to act as their expert, thus enabling me to be quickly apprised of all new discoveries of works of art and to supply direct copies of the same when required.

It may be well to mention that I am the only one in Athens in this artistic line of business, and that it is only after twenty laborious years that I have been able to form the valuable collection of Moulds I now possess; and that it is for this reason alone that I am able to supply copies of the glorious works of the Ancient Greeks at the reasonable prices quoted in the following Catalogue.

In addition to the Articles mentioned in this Catalogue I am prepared, on order, to take Casts, and attend to their shipment, of any other works of Sculpture my correspondents may desire, and at prices analogous to those of my Catalogue, for Casts of similar dimensions.

My establishment is well-known to the principal Museums and Literary Societies of Europe and America, and further on, a list is given of several learned Professors and others who have honoured me with orders for Castings, and who, I believe will be most happy to testify to the satisfactory manner in which I have executed the same.

The undersigned, and the Editor of this Catalogue, will, with much pleasure and gratuitously, undertake, if so desired, to keep all Museums and Literary Societies duly informed of all new discoveries of works of Greek Art as they take place: they are already doing so with some of these Institutions in Europe.

It is especially their desire to cultivate a correspondence on these matters with the Amateurs of the Fine Arts, and Directors

of Museums and Schools of Art in America, and Australia.

Photographs of Greek Sculpture and Architecture can be

supplied on moderate terms.

Every assistance will be rendered by the undersigned and the Editor, to strangers desirous to visit the Museums of Athens,

or to make a tour in the interior of Greece.

I would again strongly impress on my readers the important fact that all my moulds, with the single exception of No. 26 (which see) have been taken direct from the originals, and not from copies in gypsum as is usually the case, and notably with the reproductions of several European Museums which are widely circulated abroad, especially in America, but which cannot be at all considered as sufficiently faithful representations of the originals to be of effectual use to Students of the Fine Arts.
